Five years ago when I began my service on the Concord Community TV Board of Directors, Concord TV was an organization with bold aspirations but lacked the resources to deliver on them fully. The technological infrastructure was unsophisticated and outdated, the staff was small and the office space was cramped. In spite of these obstacles, the organization continued to grow slowly and steadily.

Concord Community TV grew and endured because of its community spirit and that spirit was fueled by dedicated staff, community volunteers, producers and a community-based volunteer board of directors. Additionally, I would be remiss not to recognize the many individual and corporate donors as well as city, school and Comcast officials that acknowledged the worthiness of our organization with their support. Most importantly, this community spirit has been fueled by Concord Community TV's mission which strives for the inclusion and participation of all residents in our community TV channels.

Today the spirit continues, and the dedication of our organization to the idea of community participation in the local media is as strong as ever. Besides our public name change to Concord TV, what is changing is our continued improvements to our capacity to deliver upon our mission in new, effective and innovative ways. Concord TV is in a period of growth and we are expanding our facilities, building digital infrastructure, and purchasing new equipment.

Our expansion and ongoing renovation is being done intelligently, prudently and within our means.

When Executive Director Steve Budkiewicz decided to leave us in order pursue other interests we were shaken for a bit, but fortunately we were able to find a highly qualified and visionary replacement who could follow through and build upon the plans Steve and the organization had put into place. In turn, our new Executive Director Julianne Turner has hired some new, energetic and skilled staff to meet the technological and community training challenges that are ahead. If you haven't had the opportunity, I encourage you to meet and welcome Ms. Turner and the new staff. Outreach Director Doris Ballard continues with us and we value her important role with Concord TV.

We hope that over the course of the next year, our growth will be expressed on our community TV channels and delivered to the viewer in new and elegant ways. But the core of our mission remains the same and we want to increase the number of Concord/Penacook residents and community organizations that watch and participate in Concord TV. Please tune in to cable channels 6, 17 and 22 and come on down to learn the production skills that will enable you or your organization to produce community TV programming. We want you to be part of the community spirit that is Concord TV!

From the Director

When I joined Concord TV in September of 2006 the organization was at a critical time. We were poised to successfully transform into a state of the art facility supplying quality, local programming to residents of Concord through our three channels. There were many challenges involved with the various changes along the way, but thanks to the wise and dedicated people who laid the groundwork since the organization's inception in 1998, we were ready to face the challenges and accomplish what needed to be done.

The first task; improve the quality of our three channels. We serve over 40,000 residents of Concord and hundreds of nonprofit organizations. A small percentage of people will walk through our doors in any given year. But, we know that over 15,000 homes receive our channels. So, we made a commitment to quality in FY06-07 and were able to follow through with this commitment by significantly improving the signal quality on our channels.

We also made a commitment to education with the creation of a new full time position: Training Coordinator. This new position has allowed the organization to hold its

first summer video camps for youth and offer regular classes and workshops on video production to members of the public throughout the year.

In addition to a change in staffing, we saw a change in our facility through an expansion, which doubled our space at the Concord High School, thanks to the support of the Concord School District. Renovations were complete in May and we're already seeing the amazing impact this additional space is having on our productivity.

Another big change for the station is the decision to do business as Concord TV instead of CCTV. There are so many CCTVs across the world, we decided to rebrand with a name that our community will recognize as theirs.

As the dust settles (literally in some cases) I am looking forward to our many projects over the next fiscal year; expanding our volunteer base, working with students in the schools and continuing to grow this amazing resource we all share in our community.

Construction

Before and After

Concord TV started out with 950 square feet in the Concord High School in 1999. Inside this space was the studio, control room, equipment that programmed the channels and staff offices.

Then, a couple years later, the School District allowed us to occupy an office space across the hall from our studio. This office space was quickly filled up, as the organization took on new projects and offered field equipment for Concord resident usage.

In 2005 the School District knew we needed more space in order to accomplish our growing mission and goals. The ROPE Club at the high school occupied the room next to Concord TV's office. The High School generously offered to move the ROPE Club and allow Concord TV to renovate that room and expand our space.

This happened at a serendipitous time when the City of Concord was negotiating a new franchise agreement with Comcast. Concord TV's Board Chair worked with the City of Concord to negotiate for capital funds from Comcast, who agreed to this request and supplied Concord TV with a ten-year capital grant of \$350,000.

The Concord TV Capital Improvement Committee began working on drawings for this new space and hired Mark Carrier Construction to carry out the renovations.

Construction began in April of 2007 and was completed on time at the end of May. The new space has a training room, equipment storage room, editing bay, master control room, set storage space, staff offices and a comfortable reception area where people can meet and watch Concord TV's channels. Concord TV now occupies about 2600 square feet in the High School. What a difference space can make!

The Tyson award was initiated in 2002 in honor of Blanche and David Tyson who were actively involved in Public Access Television for many years. Their consummate professionalism, deep commitment to building community through local television, and willingness to help others do the same, earned them the respect of everyone involved. Those who are recipients of the annual Tyson Award exemplify the same high standards in demonstrating outstanding efforts in advancing the mission of Concord Community TV.

Rose Marie Lanier

2001/2002 Tyson Award Recipient



I was really thrilled to receive the Tyson Award. It is the recognition of years of work in public access TV and work with others to form Concord Community TV. It also represents two volunteers from the pre-Concord TV era, Blanche and David Tyson. Both Blanche and David had public access programs. They were a

delightful, supportive, interesting couple. Blanche had a show, "Constantly Growing," that spotlighted people over sixty years old who were doing interesting things with their lives. David had two shows. One was "Circle of Friends" which was a roundtable discussion of several African-Americans living in the area. The show was picked up by the cable company. David also produced "Creativity At Work", in which he interviewed creative people in the arts and sciences.

Blanche was a short, white-haired Jewish woman who began her television "career" around the age of 80. She once said "where else would you find someone who looks like me on television." Her statement highlights one of the key elements of what public access is all about; it's about you and me and our neighbors taking the opportunity to discuss and present ideas and people at the local level. David was a tall African-American and former business owner. Not only did the Tysons produce and host their own shows but they were always willing to help and support others involved in public access TV. Blanche and David are deceased and I'm sure others who worked with them still miss them and cherish the times we spent together. They are certainly a perfect couple behind the name of the Tyson Award.

I was quite surprised and flattered to be invited to the 2005 Concord TV Annual Meeting to receive the Tyson Award. I had been away from Concord only a few months after 22 years in the community, and 6 years of association with Concord TV. Returning for the dinner and presentations, I was overwhelmed with the

warmth and shared spirit of the organization.

Concord TV gave me an opportunity to complete a portion of a mission I began in 1993. The implementation of a long range instructional technology plan for Concord schools called for the utilization of voice, data and video systems. Internet access, technology applications and a robust internal communications systems were established and part of everyday practice. There was a great need to take advantage of the equipment and infrastructure available to the schools through channel 6.

I was able to develop channel 6 to include programming featuring arts, athletics and academics. "Education Matters" became a monthly feature bringing information on special classroom projects to homes across the city. Expanded athletic coverage grew to include CHS football games with a crew of 8 staff, slow motion instant replay and cooperation with WKXL to provide professional play-by-play. Arts programming featured concerts and plays from all schools.

In my current position as Assistant Superintendent for the Rochester, NH schools, we have established our own version of educational programming through our cable provider. As a recipient of the Tyson Award, I will always be grateful for my Concord TV experience, the excellent working relationship with the staff, and the creative opportunities that have helped me grow in utilizing digital video media in support of public education.

I learned that Concord Television was awarding me the Tyson Award as I was preparing to go to NY to my oldest daughter's



Honors Convocation at RPI. I was torn. Here, unexpectedly, I had reached the pinnacle of Cable Access and simultaneously, my daughter had achieved an academic milestone. What

is a woman to do? Well, I did what any mother would do. I went to my daughter's event while the "virtual me" went

to the Concord TV Annual Dinner via DVD to accept the Tyson Award - an honor of which I am very proud.

Television production began for me in the 70's when the courts cleared the way for girls to become Boy Scouts. I immediately signed up because the Boy Scouts in Raleigh, NC did a television show on WRAL. That experience helped me get an internship between undergraduate and graduate school with the North Carolina Agency for Public Telecommunications doing a show called "OPENnet"- the Open Public Events Network. It was really the beginnings of what we now call cable access television.

In the late 1990's, a teacher by the name of Lucilla Sokol approached me about doing a business show. Nearly 175 shows and eight years later, I am still telling the story of small businesses and their concerns on "Tell It Like It Is Small Business" on Channel 22. While the politicians may forget about the needs of small business, Concord Television provides an opportunity week after week for small business to be heard.

As I came to appreciate the importance of having the opportunity to be heard, I accepted Rick Watrous' invitation to join the Board of Directors and served 6 years during a period of incredible growth from one room and a part-time ED to a state-of-the art studio with full-time staff. I am very proud of the growth of Concord Television and the work of its many volunteers and proud to be counted among them.

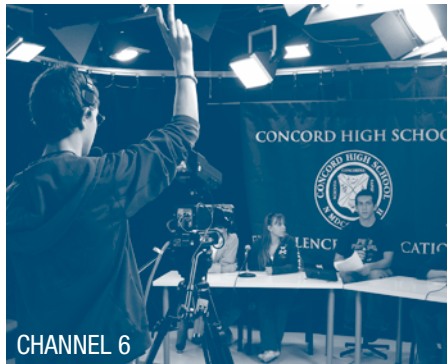
